Winter Outdoor Learning at Shamblehurst

January and February brought a lot of cold and wet weather, which really tested our resilience outdoors, but thanks to the right clothing and some positive attitudes, we were still able to enjoy a huge amount of time outside. Children have been building dens to shelter from rain and chilly winds, playing Viking Chess to warm up cold bodies as well as learning and creating many games designed to develop resilience, collaboration and communication with an emphasis on healthy well-being.

Year 3, 4, 5 and 6 children have also been participating in lots of challenges designed to test their metacognition and lateral thinking, with each challenge using a different range of skills from guessing and estimation, logic, imagination, accuracy and confidence.

Tasks are set up with the purpose of children earning points for themselves as well as for their class, competing against other classes in their year group and across the school. Listening skills are essential to understanding the task. It is up to them to work independently and as part of a team to attempt to get the most points. Tasks so far have included; the SpongeBob challenge, the best upside down self-portrait, 100 seconds and a tricky task involving a wheelie bin and tennis balls. It's been amazing to see the children tackle these challenges with such positive attitudes using wonderfully creative ideas and awesome logic, there has of course been many rather odd responses but even some of these have earned points!

They have really embraced the competition and all classes are focussed on winning their year group battle, as well as beating all the other year groups and with one week left of tasks, any class could still win and receive the ultimate honour of being the Shamblehust Challenge Champions!







Although we are not all together this year for World Book Day, we still want the children to share and celebrate their love of books.

This year, we will be celebrating World Book Day over two days (Thursday 4th and Friday 5th), so that the children can have some time away from the screens and really immerse themselves in some lovely activities involving all things books and reading.
