A Message From

Mrs Jones

Wow! What a busy month in school. Well done Year 6 who completed all their SATS tests this month with confidence and determination. Considering the bumpy last two years, they were all exceptional in their positive attitude and commitment to do their very best. Year 2 also completed their SATS this month which will inform the teacher assessment judgement at the end of the year. They too were equally fabulous in their approach.

Coming up in June we have Year 1 Phonics Screening Check and the Year 4 Multiplication Check. We do try and keep these assessments as normal for the children and they are administered by known staff. This data will be reported to parents in the children's reports in July.

Thank you to all parent who completed the OFSTED type questionnaire in March. This has been shared with staff and our Governing Body.

We have already put some things in action as a result of the questionnaire.

Firstly, for those parents whose children has SEND, 47.7% were unsure as to what support their child received in school. Parents of children who have an area of special educational needs should be offered three additional meetings a year to discuss the ADPR targets that teachers have written. In addition, at all parents' evenings Mrs Burrell, our SENDCo offers parents an opportunity to have an additional meeting with herself.

9.8% of parents disagreed with the statement 'The school has high expectations for my child'. As part of our school improvement plan we are working with teachers and LSAS to ensure all children are challenged effectively. We have two twilight sessions planned this year focussed on developing a really strong awareness as to how children learn, looking at the brain science behind this, but also focussed on questioning and challenge within lessons.

6.4% of parents felt school did not support their child's wider development. The way we hope to support the wider development of your children is through offering an inspirational and exciting curriculum that enables children to ask and answer questions on a local, national and global level. We try to ensure that children are taken on really worthwhile and exciting trips, we invite guest visitors in to school to support learning, we provide many free and some funded clubs and activities after school as well as having three residential visits, in Year 4, Year 5 and Year 6. Some of these activities have been really impacted by the pandemic and we are gradually building them back up. We also have a very strong personal, social and health education which is designed to support personal development. Children have weekly personal development sessions where they might talk about relationships, British Values, friendship issues, issues around discrimination and prejudice as well as subjects that might have come up through the week that children want to discuss. We have three key stage assemblies each week, one is focussed on well-being and mental health, as well as diversity and difference. The other reflects more on our school Values and issues within school. The third is a celebration each week of the children's achievements. We use Philosophy 4 Children to enhance our curriculum and children take part in debates and philosophical enquiries exploring their opinions and beliefs. We also use a scheme called Let's think in English which also encourages children to discuss and debate ideas and opinions either about a piece of literature, art or a film.

Lastly we have 5 impact days each year, coming up we have Bee Day, where the whole school will be learning about the impact that Bee's have on our planet and what they can do to prevent the destruction of their habitat. We have had recently Down's Syndrome Day and Rainforest Day is coming in June. The idea around our impact days is to give children another layer of learning. Impact days in the past have enabled us to buy a toilet for a school in Africa, support Australian Charities following the Wild fires as well as empathise with Refugees and raise a considerable amount of money for Refugee charities - this was all through a pandemic!

4.6% of those parents who completed the questionnaire felt that school did not ensure that pupils are well behaved. As a school we have recently reviewed our behaviour policy. There will also be a presentation to parents on Wednesday 22nd June, one at 9:00am and one at 2:30pm so that it is really clear how our behaviour policy works and the philosophy behind it. A recent report written about our school stated, "The behaviour in classes and around the school is strong; pupils are polite and willing to share their thinking."

Firstly, for those parents whose children has SEND, 47.7% were unsure as to what support their child received in school. Parents of children who have an area of special educational needs should be offered three additional meetings a year to discuss the ADPR targets that teachers have written. In addition, at all parents' evenings Mrs Burrell, our SENDCo offers parents an opportunity to have an additional meeting with herself. In addition, Mrs Burrell will be sending a letter to all parents of children who are on our SEND register. This will outline what your child's needs are and what provision is in place.

We will now reintroduce our monthly SEND drop in coffee afternoons which were so powerful before Covid. We look forward to welcoming you back.

97.4% of responses stated they would recommend Shamblehurst to other parents. Thank you for this. We do aspire to get this to 100% and would always ask parents to come and talk to us should they have issues within the school they are not happy about.

We will holding a meeting for parents run by Sally Mohamed, Deputy Head, Curriculum lead and some Year 6 students outlining our curriculum model and showcasing some of the exceptional learning outcomes throughout the school on Friday 17th June at 9-10 am and 2-3 pm. We hope many of you will join us. Tea, coffee and biscuits provided!

Can I thank you for your time in completing the questionnaire and we will continue to strive to improve all the scores over the next year.

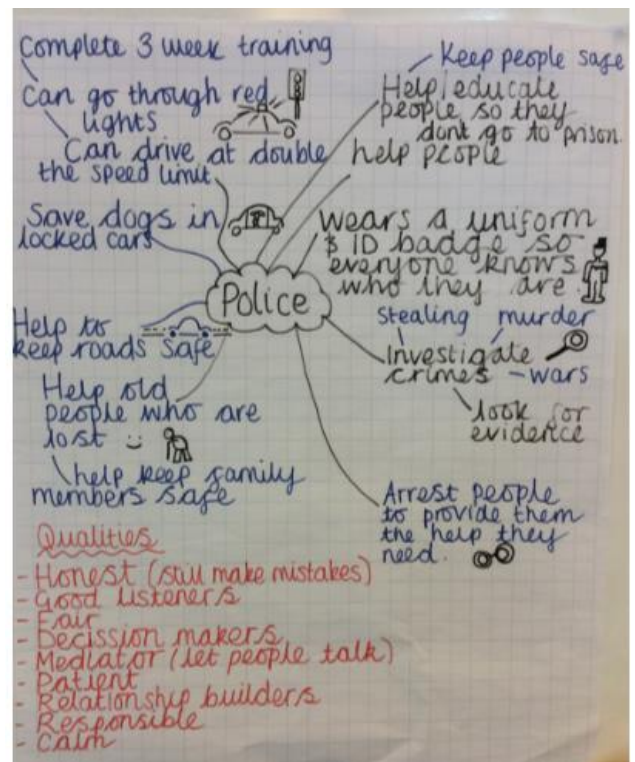
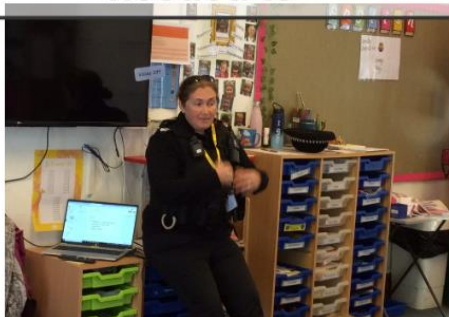


Year 2 - Police Visit

Attendance Update

I am pleased to share with you all that after a really difficult few years with the pandemic, our whole school attendance now stands at **94.2%** which is really close to our target of 95% and above.

We know that regular school attendance really does make a huge difference to the children's learning and social development. Thank you for supporting your children to attend every day that they are able to.

COVID 19—An update

As you will be aware, testing is no longer as available. With this in mind our school policy is as follows:

- If your child has a temperature of over 37.5 degrees they should not attend school, you should seek medical advice and return your child to school when they no longer have a temperature.
- If your child has been tested and is positive for COVID-19, please keep them home from school for 3 days after the positive result, and return them to school after this time.

Absence without reason

It is a legal requirement for parents to notify the school **each day that a child is absent**. Parents must call and leave a message on the absence line (01489 782342) or email adminoffice@shamblehurst.hants.sch.uk before 9:30am.

If we do not have a reason provided before the end of the day (3.20pm) the whole day will be coded as unauthorised, and 5 or more days of unauthorised absence can cause a fine to be raised.

Holiday Requests

Please note that we are unable to authorise holiday unless it is for an exceptional reason. Examples include a parent's wedding, a funeral or a religious ceremony. It is worth reminding all parents that absence of 5 days or more of unauthorised absence will cause a fine to be raised. Please arrange any family holidays for the school holidays.

Absence for more than 3 days

Most illnesses will only require a few days of absence from school. As part of our attendance policy, once a child has been out of school for 3 days due to ill health, we will ask for parents to provide medical evidence to allow us to continue to authorise their absence. Medical evidence can be anything from proof of contact with a doctor or pharmacist, or a picture of a current prescription.

Thank you all who participated with our Walk to School scheme that ran in May.

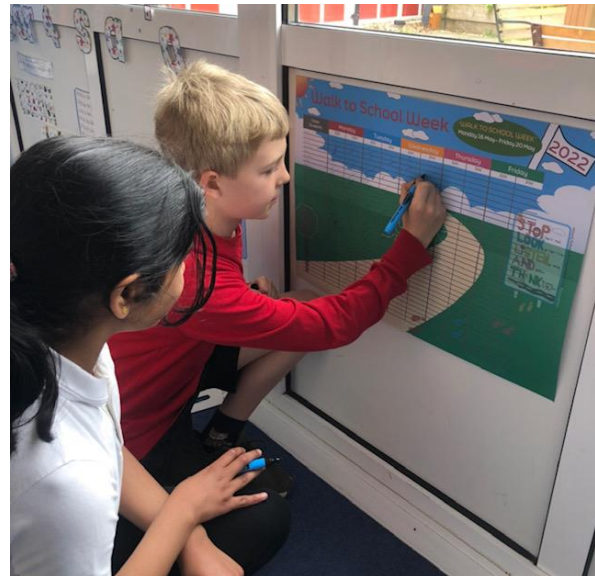

Learn and follow these simple instructions to ensure you always remain safe when crossing the road.

FIND A SAFE PLACE TO CROSS	STOP	LOOK & LISTEN	LET TRAFFIC PASS	DO NOT RUN!
<ul style="list-style-type: none">• The safest places to cross the road are pelican crossings, zebra crossings, subways, footbridges or where there is a traffic warden or school patrol to assist you.• It is worth walking a little further to find one of these places.• If none of these are available find a section of road with no obstructions.• Never cross next to or between parked cars.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Do not stand too close to the edge of the kerb.• If there is no pavement stand back from the edge of the road.• Make sure you still have a good view up and down the road.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Traffic may approach from any direction. Football at Watford - 16th and 17th May 2022

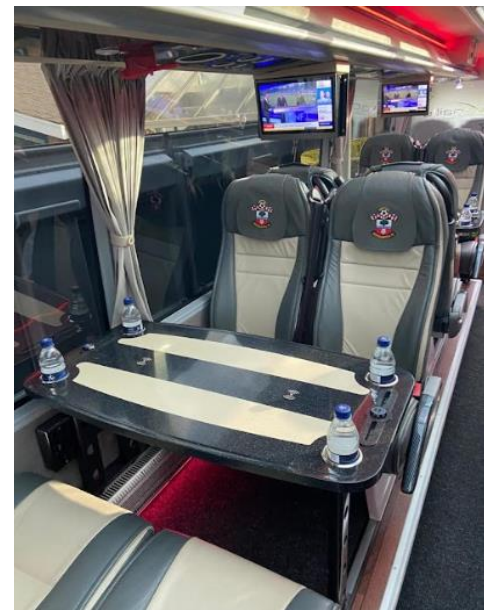
Wow, what an experience! It is hard to put into words how amazing this trip was, for us staff and the children!

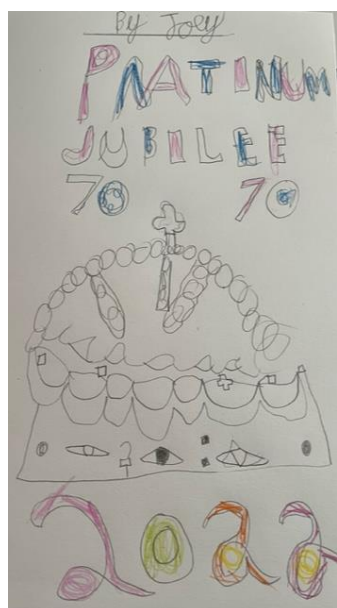
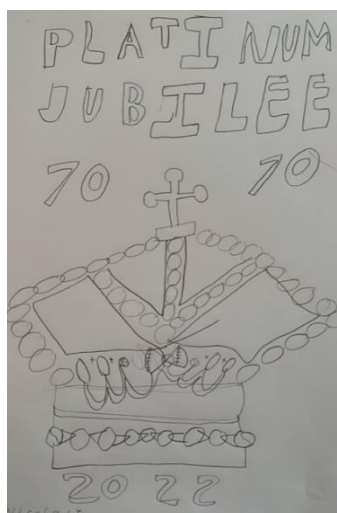

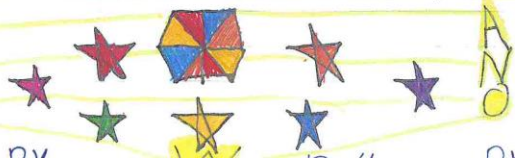
