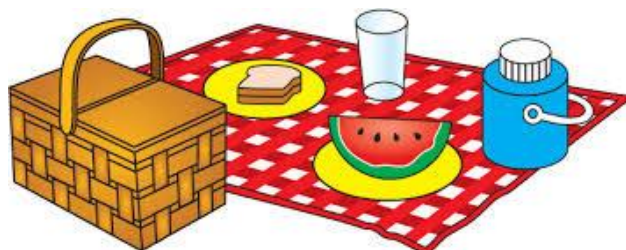

Healthy Lunchboxes

Shamblehurst promotes healthy eating. A balanced, healthy, nutritious diet is important for the development of a child's physical state, as well as for their intellectual abilities.

Please note the following recommended guidelines set out by the British Nutrition Foundation.

A child's lunch should include only the following:

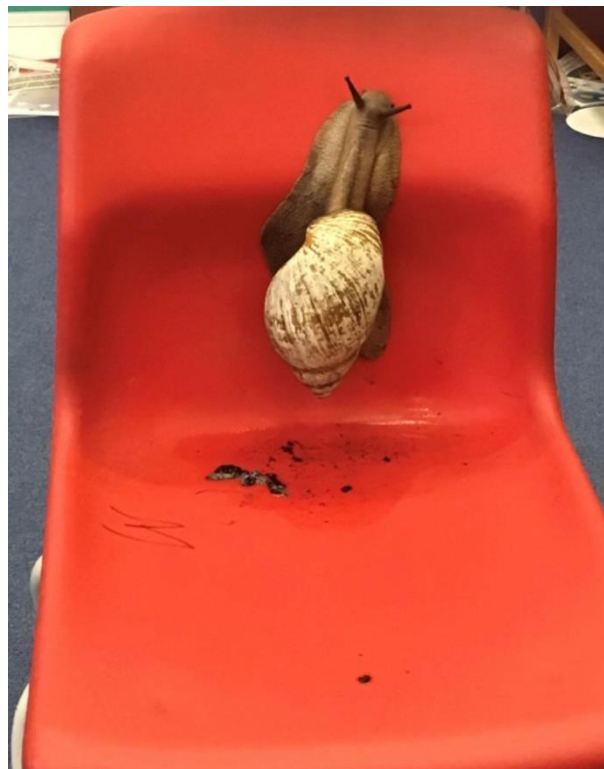
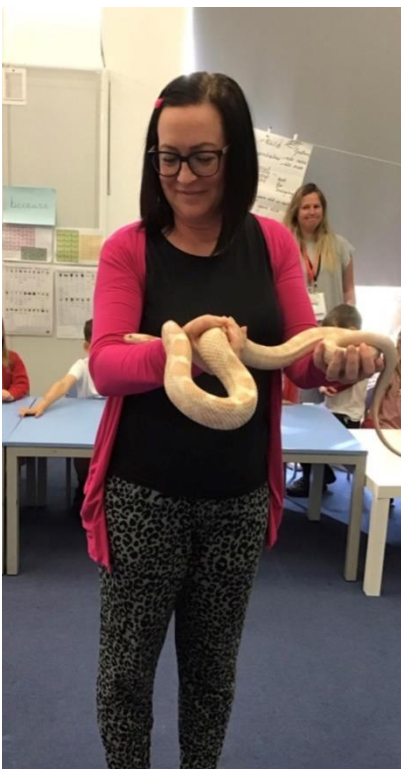
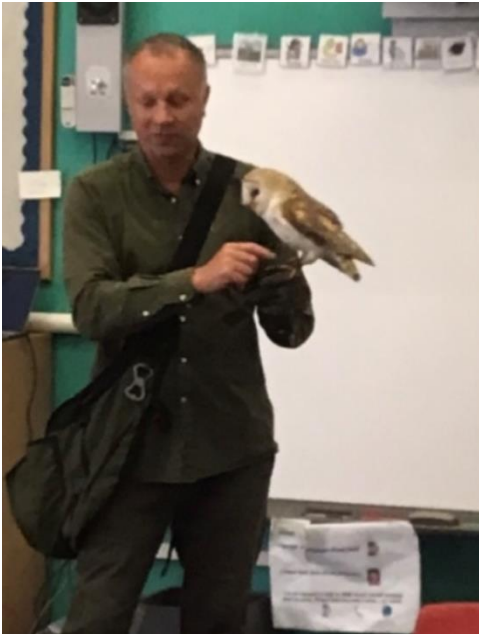
- A portion of starchy food, eg. wholegrain bap/bread, pitta bread, plain crackers, pasta or rice salad
- Fresh fruit and vegetables, eg. apple/orange/banana, cherry tomatoes, carrot sticks, mini fruit chunks, etc
 - A portion of milk or dairy food, eg. cheese, plain/fruit yoghurt, etc
- Small portion of lean meat, fish or alternative, eg. two slices of ham, chicken, beef Quorn, cheese, tuna, egg or hummus, etc
 - A drink - fruit juice (not fizzy), water (not flavoured), milk (not flavoured)

Should Zoos Exist?

As part of our enquiry 'Should Zoos Exist?', we had a visit from Dave Sharpe - Raptor Xotics who brought with him a variety of animals from the different classification groups we have been learning about.

Dave discussed why he feels zoos and animal centres are important in helping us to breed animals that are near extinction and also to help us learn about animals and their care so that for us and the future generations these animals are around on our planet. We had the pleasure of learning about and touching or holding a barn owl, a hissing cockroach, a rat, a giant African land snail, a crested gecko, a scorpion, a black rat snake and a giant stick insect. All the children were really brave in touching and holding the animals. They asked some really good questions to help us build on our knowledge and were very respectful to Dave and the animals. An amazing experience was had by all.

Christians believe the Bible has authority

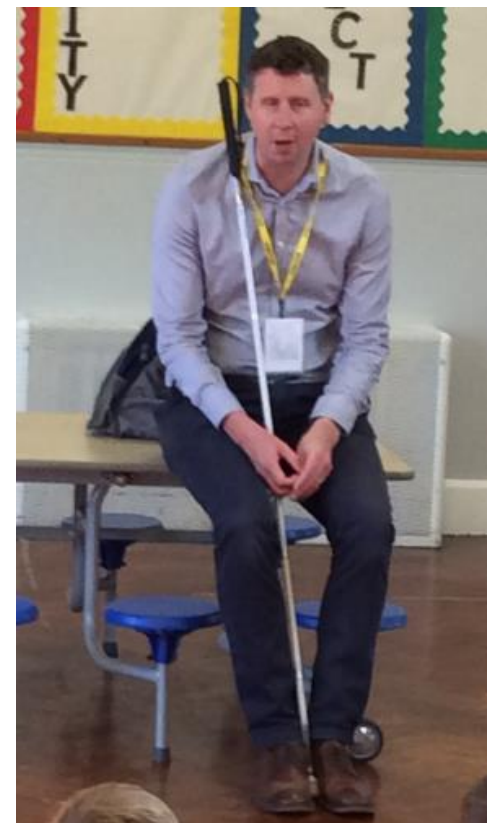
Year 2 had a visit from a blind vicar from St Luke's church called Ben.

Year 2 are exploring 'What makes a Hero?' as part of their enquiry this term.

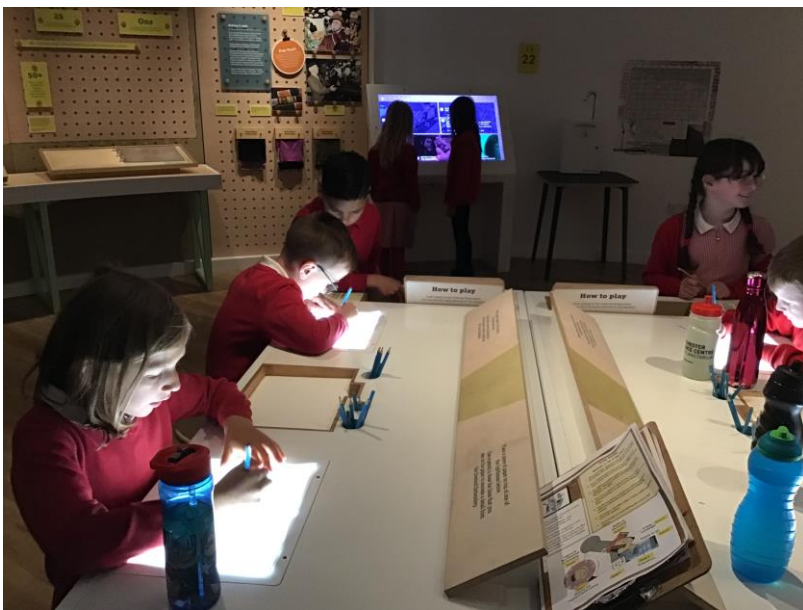
As part of this, they had a visit from the guide dogs on Monday. Year 2 will be producing posters as part of their English work to try and raise money for this cause.

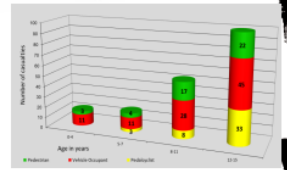

ROAD SAFETY NEWSLETTER YEAR 6 TRANSITION

Transition Road Safety for Parents and Guardians of Year 6 pupils

Your child is starting their journey on to Secondary School soon and you may have some concerns about the transition to this stage. The Road Safety Team want to support you with their safety to and from school, which may be their first regular independent journey.

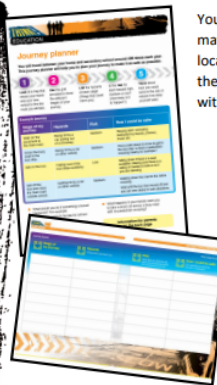
Read below and overleaf to gain some ideas about how you can help them stay safer on their journey to and from school from day one.



The graph above shows our casualty statistics in Hampshire in 2020 for young people, showing there were 185 casualties aged 0 - 15 years. This highlights the increase in casualties as they get older.

Young people are more at risk as they get older and are beginning to travel more independently. With traffic being the biggest single cause of accidental death for 12-16 year olds, it is essential your child understands the risks on their journeys to and from school, at peak time, and why and how they need to think about the responsible choices to keep themselves safe.

Plan & rehearse their route to school



Your child will be making the transition to Secondary School soon. They may be taking their first independent journey to school - to a new location. The questions below are ones you may be considering and therefore hopefully these suggestions will support you and your child with this transition.

- Have they made that route before?
- Have they crossed those roads, at peak time, before?
- Have they crossed any roads independently at peak time before?
- Do they know the route they will be taking?
- Are they walking with friends?

All of these questions can be covered by completing this activity with your child. It suggests you practice the route with your child, considering the risks and how they can be minimised. You could use one of their transition says to practice the route with them, when it is busy and at the time of day they will be making the journey.

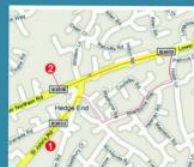
