On Friday 5th May, Year One spent the day celebrating the coronation of our new King in true British style! The children were dressed in red, white and blue. We also created a commemorative place mat to use at the afternoon tea. In the afternoon we enjoyed an afternoon 'High Tea' boasting a red, white and blue theme. Scones with cream and jam, strawberries and blueberries. Thank you to our parents for providing such wonderful treats for us to enjoy. It certainly was very delicious!







Mrs Jones received an email from The Woodland Trust saying that we could apply for some trees for free. I chose the 15-tree pack and applied for it. This pack included rowan, hazel and crab apple, all native to U.K. and chosen by the Woodland Trust as trees that would thrive in an urban environment. The Woodland Trust told us that we had been successful and that the trees would arrive in March.

The Eco Warriors and I went out and examined the school grounds, measuring up different spaces and thinking about where would be the best place to put the trees. We decided that they would be best making a hedge along the back fence of the field to make a sound barrier for the houses there, a run through for wildlife from the two patches of trees and shrubs and would be suitable there for pollinators and birds.

March arrived and the saplings appeared at school. Mr Richards kindly said that he would plant the young trees with the Eco Warriors after school. The message was sent out and the Eco Warriors and the wonderful Mr Richards prepared the ground and planted the trees. Mr Richards and the Eco Warriors discovered that the trees wouldn't work along the fence so instead planted some at the fence by Year 6, the outdoor hut and the pond area. Please look out for them if you are on the field. At the moment the YR6 Eco Warriors Ziggy and Lucy are watering the saplings but after half term we will have a rota in place so that all the Eco Warriors get a chance to look after them by weeding them and watering them if they need it.

A huge thank you to Mr Richards and the Eco Warriors for making our school grounds a tree friendly space!
